




MG1: "Rivers in Oxford and Paris", 55.5 x 170 cm, £49





Mark Batchelor

Drawing from an object is always a process of interpretation which forces you to focus on a single work in a way you never do as a casual visitor to a gallery or museum. You start to understand the meaning and history of that object and build up an understanding of the skill and purpose of its' creator.


students to work in different media such as oil, watercolour, gouache and pastels. We paint a range of

Tony Evans







Jonathan Perks


John Coughlan

My artistic practice is primarily concerned with process-driven painting, and sculpture which is a recent development.



I view my work as an afterthought, a passing of undigested stress, a cathartic chewing that spits out whatever has worn me down throughout the day.


My paintings are mainly abstract, with hints as to a form or partial representation of something, like an animal or part of one. My sculpture work, in contrast, is fully representational, typically featuring anthropomorphic creatures' frozen mid-step, with arms open wide. Through either medium, I let the paint slip and slide, let it guide my brush to its next stroke or I follow how a lump of clay has slumped, and thus mould it into a figure.

In that way, my artistic practice is a form of self-therapy, where it is up to the material to let me know what I should do, and therefore I can let go and finally, relax.
